Guest Speaker, Glynis Saunders, (President of Golden Beach Community Garden in Westminster Street) gave an informative talk on the garden project, how it is funded, what assistance is provided by volunteers and Council and talked about the group's vision for an inclusive and inviting Community garden.

Expansion plans include 14 more garden beds to be installed with Council assistance. There is the proposal for some garden beds to be leased by individuals for their private use, which in turn assists with running costs. The ultimate aim is for water to be provided from a solar powered bore/spear and facilities provided for educational talks on all things "garden". It was disappointing for us to hear that the Garden had lost all the plants from one of the garden beds to thieves. Thank you so much Glynis for your commitment to Community.

Discussions with SC Oxenford included:

- Illegal and displaced person camping between Golden Beach (GB) and Bells Creek including Military Jetty.
- Council are making an effort to discourage camping behind the old Caloundra Road information building. Any resident who is concerned about camping in their area is advised to contact Council on their 24hr phone number 5475 7272. Unless these concerns are reported Council has no knowledge or basis on which to act and if needed, Council will involve Police.

- Electric mobility device riders continue to be a concern for both pedestrians and road users. The Police advise the management of these issues is shared between Council and Police. SC Oxenford brought along a brochure, "Rules for riders" which can be viewed on streetsmarts.initiatives. qld.gov.au/pmd/get-the-facts. This includes details of fines and key rules such as 12km/hr speed limit on footpaths, 25km/hr maximum speed on bike paths and roads, no doubling etc.
- Police advised of new empowerment laws which include action to increase penalties for stealing or damage to emergency vehicles; youth bail will allow for the fitment of electronic monitoring.
- Council continue to work on strengthening the Golden Beach sea wall. The sea wall near Nelson Street pavilion is now finished and construction work will move closer to TS Onslow Navy Cadet building.

Our next meeting will be 30 April at our usual time of 4pm sharp, upstairs at the Caloundra Power Boat Club. You are welcome to come along and listen to our guest speaker from the Office of Fair Trading who will speak to us on:

- What are scams and how do they work
- Some statistics and examples of scams
- · What to do if you are approached by a scammer
- Where to report a scam and where to get help.

Take Action for Pumicestone Passage (TAPP) Inc

At the last TAPP Inc meeting the issue of Fire Ants was raised. Fire ants are a serious risk to communities, people and wildlife. Currently they have been discovered at North Arm, Yandina, the fourth place on the Sunshine Coast. Close locations to Golden Beach have been at Aura and Currimundi.

Fire ants are small, 2 – 6 mm in length and a copper brown colour. There are several different sized ants in a colony. Nests are hard to identify and may look like loose earth with no clear entry or exit holes. They can be found in warm open areas or recently disturbed ground. It can be months before above ground nests are formed, making it hard to identify colonies in the early stage of their development. Because of the underground network of the nests, it is particularly hard to treat the nests. It is important if they are discovered in an area, that all properties are treated whether ants are visible or not. Fire ants in their mating stage have wings and the queen, with a lifetime of eggs, can fly up to five kilometres to establish a new colony. This puts Golden Beach well within the range of contamination from identified colonies. Ants can be transferred when soil is moved from one location to another so care is needed when transferring garden soil or other garden products.







Fire ants inflict a painful sting, and colonies will attack in swarms. They can kill small animals and can inflict serious reaction in humans, particularly to anyone with an allergy. Because of the difficulty in identifying their location in the early stages, they are a formidable pest. A national eradication program has not been able to contain the spread of Fire Ants to date, however, community support to identify locations of nests is essential. It is an issue that cannot be ignored and with effective treatment, it is hoped that we can eradicate them by 2032.

In areas that have been identified as contaminated all properties will be treated. If our area is identified as containing Fire Ants, on treatment day, the on-ground staff will arrive at your property. Please allow them access to your property to carry out their work. For urban properties, the eradication officers will load fire ant treatment granules into handheld spreaders to treat around your home, buildings, gardens, and waterways. The ant bait is a low concentration of active ingredient, and it would be nearly impossible for humans or animals to find and consume sufficient granules to make themselves sick. Fire ants can cause death to animals and serious reactions in humans.

Something the CPBCFC would like to highlight to readers is the change to a key safety regulation about life jackets. We believe that in this early stage of instigation authorities are issuing warnings for non-compliance, but actual penalties will be forthcoming soon.

Did you know that new lifejacket rules were implemented on the 1st December 2024?

Wearing a lifejacket is now compulsory when:

- alone or accompanied by children under 12 years in an open boat less than 4.8m in length and underway;
- crossing a coastal bar in an open boat, as well as in any open area of a boat of any length, and on certain craft;
- boating between sunset and sunrise in an open boat less than 4.8m in length and underway; and
- underway in an open boat or in the open area of a boat of any length with children over one year and under 12 years.

Check out the Maritime Safety Queensland website at https://www.msq.qld.gov.au/safety/life-jackets. The lifejacket rules for riding a jet ski (personal watercraft) remain the same.
