Neighbourhood Watch Coordinator's Report

Two representatives of Queensland Police Service, along with a guest speaker from the Office of Fair Trading (OFT) Branch of the Justice Department attended the NHW meeting held 30 April 2025 at Caloundra Power Boat Club.

The OFT speaker clarified the Departments role which is "deliver a fair and safe market place in Queensland". This was supported by an excellent Power Point presentation focusing on what is considered to be a scam. This topic lead to much discussion, including talk around new malware targeting financial institutions and the public. The public can access the website at https://www.cyber.gov.au for IT related information.

Senior Constable (S/C) Peter Oxenford referred to points raised by the scam presentation and advised that a scammer had operated in the local area using Facebook Marketplace. S/C Oxenford also raised the incidence of 'drug driving' and the need to be vigilant whilst driving on our roads, with reference to erratic behaviour/road rage incidents. Do not react, protect yourself and your family. S/C Tina Bland from the District Crime Prevention Unit discussed the "Safer Together" event to be held in Nambour, and cautioned all on opportunistic crime which occurs when we become complacent in simple matters, such as leaving our garage door up, keys on view etc.

The meeting was asked if anyone was prepared to assume the position of Area Coordinator. There was no nomination. However, a nomination for the position of Treasurer was received earlier in the meeting. Area Coordinator is a **mandatory** position.

Therefore, at the direction of QPS, an Extraordinary General Meeting must be held within six weeks of a Notice of Meeting being issued as set out on the front page of this Newsletter. The meeting will be at the Caloundra Power Boat Club at 4pm on Wednesday 23 July 2025. Should no one from the Golden Beach NHW area nominate, then the process to close Golden Beach NHW will commence, and this newsletter will be the last ever. I urge you to read the NHW history in this newsletter, prepared by long term Committee Member, Kay Middlemiss.

In closing, should this be the last ever GBNHW newsletter, we need to celebrate all those selfless volunteers who have walked our streets, giving their time, for something that they believe to benefit their Community. Many volunteers are of advanced age and some are still working, but make time in their busy lives to do this. Golden Beach Neighbourhood Watch History 1991 - 2025

Neighbourhood Watch was officially formed in Golden Beach on 23 October 1991 with the following members; Ken Muir, Peter and Patsy Jackson, Jim and Lorna Falconer, Don Macpherson. Later members were Ann Copley, Terry Davies, Alex McGory, Ashley Prince, Heather Dunlevie. Kay Middlemiss along with many others have contributed in elected roles or delivered newsletters as "Blockies" and continued to represent the Golden Beach area. Initially meetings were held in homes and local parks until the Caloundra Power Boat Club opened their rooms to facilitate the opportunity for the community to come together and share concerns.



Over the years, the Golden Beach community has changed with a higher population and an influx of interstate and overseas residents. It has mixed demographics from older residents preferring a quiet beach side haven to younger families moving here to enjoy a busy recreational playground. Like many volunteer organisations we have struggled to find volunteers. Nearby Neighbourhood Watch groups have gradually ceased to exist, prompting an amalgamation of Diamond Head NHW (which started in 1990), the northern Golden Beach 1 NHW group and the southern Golden Beach 6 NHW group.

In the last six years the amalgamated group have distributed newsletters to over 3000 properties in Golden Beach. We have successfully liaised with Police through

Liaison Officers, Senior Constables Peter Dickens and Peter Oxenford as well as Division 2 Councilors and members of State Parliament to provide updates on the area and share concerns.

Many community organisations have willingly volunteered guest speakers at our meetings ranging from Emergency Services, Councilors, Politicians, Crime Stoppers, Solicitors, Local Historians, Night Eyes and Wildlife Rescue Services. One of our meetings had some excitement when the Caloundra Fire Brigade team were our guest speakers and their alarms were suddenly activated in the room and they were called out to an emergency. We have supported wildlife causes such as the Twinnies Bird Rescue, the local School Chaplain Program and giving donations to various groups struggling to deliver their services to the community. Some of our members visited classrooms in schools to talk about Neighbourhood Watch. The Water Police have also been an active presence in our area stopping boat ramp rage and curbing alcohol related problems out on the water. Sometimes they timed it right to join our BBQ in the park for a free feed.

The following achievements by Golden Beach NHW are summarised below:

Newsletters continue to be produced and delivered to the community providing updated information and notifying the community of events.

Petitions were signed to have lower speed limits placed through Golden Beach. A campaign was also raised against a Youth Detention Centre being placed in the middle of a family friendly tourist destination in Caloundra.

An **Automatic Number Plate Recognition Camera** was installed to help identify unlawful traffic entering and exiting the Community.

Neighbourhood Watch signs were established in prominent locations and improved lighting was installed by Council after requests for greater security in streets/ walkway areas. 50 and 40 km/hr speed limit signs were also installed in the Golden Beach area.

Reporting situations that are brought to our attention, including drug/theft related incidents. Keeping our area as one of the safest places to live in.

Resolving parking issues related to over sized vehicles blocking driveways and limiting drivers' visibility.

Construction of picnic tables and benches in the park opposite Golden Beach Shops. Construction was possible through Council and Golden Beach Community Association allocating money to the project in 2023.

Instigated the cleaning and replacement of the William Landsborough plaques.



Neighbourhood Watch faced closure in 2018. However the group was fortunate to find a new leadership team in David Radcliffe, Tracey Carbis, Theo Stavropoulos, Rick Andrew, Dennis Evans and Carl McGarrity stepping in to take on areas of responsibility and a larger committee. During this period, a greater community presence was achieved with public interaction and fundraising, expanding our newsletter content and distribution, and holding events with funds raised through advertising. Regular events such as 'Come and Try' Bowls Days, 'Christmas in July' and BBQs in the park were opportunities to show we were part of the community. One highlight was celebrating 30 years of Golden Beach NHW with a 'Family Fun Day' including live music and stalls in Fraser Park.

Golden Beach NHW were invited to be part of a Division 2 Council forum of many local community groups that met four times a year. This was an opportunity to voice concerns and table items for discussion, consideration and implementation with Council. Committee members Kaye Stoksik and Kay Middlemiss were regularly in attendance.

In 2024, Golden Beach NHW again faced closure. Members Greg Lyne, Dorothy Summerfield, Janice Chilcott, Wendy Townsley, Carl McGarrity and Kay Middlemiss have stepped in, but in order for the group to remain relevant

into the future, we require more volunteers. The October 2024 State election was won with the focus being on crime prevention. It is everyone's right to feel safe in their homes, in the streets, shopping centres and businesses. Without the support of the community, a group such as ours, could not have continued for as long as it has. The emphasis has been on all of us not to be complacent, instead be vigilant and proactive in reporting issues to the Police. Through community representation, funding and support we continued to promote Golden Beach as a Neighbourhood Watch area.

Facebook, Police blogs and alternative media platforms are continually evolving to become the norm for communicating instant information on what is happening in the area. For many people, face to face interaction and liaising with Police through an organised event was preferred, over viewing computer information. Neighbourhood Watch provides a platform to raise concerns that otherwise, when people are on their own, may not feel confident enough to report or engage in giving details. We have been that voice to the Golden Beach community for 34 years. Special thanks to our Police Officers who have been involved in NHW from its inception, giving updates on issues within our area and our "Blockies" for delivering newsletters throughout the years.



Take Action for Pumicestone Passage (TAPP) Inc

TAPP, formed in 2010 to address the development of Caloundra South which was at that time Called In by the government Urban Land Development Authority, (ULDA). This diminished opportunity for community input and removed Council responsibility for the development. The relationship with the development has led

to the creation of the Aura Engagement Group, an ongoing community engagement connection with Aura development.

TAPP was also a foundation signatory for the Pumicestone Passage Catchment Network, (PPCN) Created by Sunshine Coast and Moreton Bay Councils. TAPP in conjunction with Healthy Land and Water, (HL&W), led the TS Onslow mangrove project, which unfortunately suffered irreversible damage following the Bribie Island breakthrough in 2022. TAPP and HL&W were in the process of establishing bank stabilization to reduce erosion of Bells Creek and preserve the many important Cultural Heritage sites present in the area. Due to the earlier than predicted breakthrough of Bribie Island, this project has also been placed on hold.

TAPP made a direct approach to the Department of the Environment, (DES), during the first wash-over to request action to prevent further loss of the Island. We argued emphatically for consideration of action to arrest the erosion and restore and stabilize the Island. This was refused and DES argued that the process was entirely natural and would result in limited change with consequences easily addressed by the Council.

The new government has undertaken a review to understand the reason for the erosion and to establish action to manage and potentially restore the Island. We now know the consequences are far more serious than predicted, with ongoing erosion threatening the loss of the entire Island spit with many other adverse impacts now becoming evident. Communication for this has now fallen to the Pumicestone Passage Catchment Management Body who are also looking toward the formation of the Sunshine Coast Waterways Authority.

The role of TAPP has not, at this time, diminished in relation to involvement with issues associated with the Passage and impacts affecting the Catchment. The future for TAPP is dependent on finding people willing to fill the positions on the Executive. I will be retiring as President at the AGM in August this year after having held the position for 12 of the 15 years TAPP have operated. TAPP are appealing for someone to step up and fill this position. It is not necessary to have years of experience or understanding of the Passage. The ability to conduct a meeting and lead the team into the future is what matters. A change of leadership will be beneficial and create an opportunity to address local issues with a different

approach. TAPP has an established relationship with local developers, Council and Government so the group's reputation has already been established.
